

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# Forest Legacy Program Synopsis

## Program Purpose

The purpose of the Forest Legacy Program (FLP) is to protect environmentally important forest areas that are threatened by conversion to nonforest uses.

## Program Description

The Forest Legacy Program is a partnership between participating States and the Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture. These two entities work together to identify important forest lands and protect them for future generations.

Conservation easements are the primary tool used to achieve this goal. Priority is given to lands that have important scenic or recreational values; riparian areas; fish and wildlife values, including threatened and endangered species; or other ecological values.

## Program Characteristics

- The Forest Legacy Program is entirely voluntary. It operates only in States that have elected to join the program.
- The program helps States and regions identify important forest areas. Lands targeted for protection must fall within designated Forest Legacy Areas.
- State and local partners select priority tracts in cooperation with the Forest Service.
- The program is based on a “willing seller and willing buyer” concept.
- When conservation easements are used, the land remains privately owned.
- Other protection tools include full-fee purchase, voluntary deed restrictions, covenants, and agreements.
- The interests in land may be held by the Federal government, or by the State or a unit of local government if the State chooses to select the State Grant Option as authorized by the 1996 Farm Bill.
- When the Federal government holds the easement, State or local units of government agree to administer the lands or interests in lands.
- The lands and interests are held in perpetuity. There is no loss of the Federal investment resulting from change of ownership.
- Forest Stewardship Plans that meet the landowner’s objectives for natural resource management are prepared on all privately owned tracts.
- The tracts acquired can remain “working forests” and can forever provide forest resources to meet the needs of the local community and the Nation.



# Partner Roles

## The Federal Role

The significance of the public benefits of a particular forest ranges from local to national. Larger forests tend to be nationally significant because the values they provide are becoming rarer. Extensive forest areas are often subject to the additional challenge of multiple ownerships and numerous political jurisdictions. Through the Forest Legacy Program, the Federal government helps State and local governments look beyond their political boundaries to identify important forest areas. The Federal government provides oversight, and financial and technical assistance to help protect important forests.

## The State Role

States integrate partner resources to cooperatively protect and maintain a forest land base. The lead agency, usually the State forestry agency, carries out the FLP in the State. Responsibilities include the following:

- Collecting information to identify and delineate important forest areas that may be selected as Forest Legacy Areas.
- Consulting with the State Forest Stewardship Coordinating Committee to achieve program purposes.
- Addressing land protection and forest management issues.
- Conducting land acquisition activities.
- Integrating policies and incentives to conserve a forest land base.
- Holding and administering the lands or interests in land that enter the FLP.
- Monitoring tracts for program compliance.

## The State Forest Stewardship Coordinating Committee Role

The State Forest Stewardship Coordinating Committee's role is identified in the Cooperative Forestry Assistance Act. The committee's consulting and recommending duties for the Forest Legacy Program are identified in the act and the FLP guidelines, and include the following:

- Establishing eligibility criteria and recommending Forest Legacy Areas in the Assessment of Need process.
- Prioritizing lands for inclusion in the FLP.

- Advising the State lead agency in order to achieve Forest Legacy Program objectives.

## The Nongovernmental Organization (Land Trust) Role

Nongovernmental organizations, specifically land trusts or similar organizations, have a distinct relationship with the FLP. Because of their compatible interest in protecting land for conservation purposes, land trusts can be a primary contact with landowners to negotiate the purchase of conservation easements and to monitor the conservation easements once they are enrolled in the FLP. Lands acquired by or donated to land trusts may be counted toward the non-Federal cost-share amount of total program costs, provided the interests in lands contribute to the goals of the Forest Legacy Program and the lands are located within a Forest Legacy Area.

## The Landowner Role

Landowner participation in the FLP is voluntary. A landowner joins the program either by conveying interests in lands to achieve the conservation objectives of the FLP or by purchasing or inheriting land that has already been committed to an FLP conservation easement. The landowner becomes a primary practitioner in maintaining the forest land base by implementing management activities guided by a Forest Stewardship Plan to conserve the values for which the land entered the program.

# In the Spotlight: Planning for Perpetuity

Maintaining Forest Legacy conservation easements forever will take foresight by the agency that is responsible for them. Conservation easements must be monitored, and this information must be recorded to maintain the integrity of the lands that are being protected. However, both agency personnel and agencies can change. Agencies need a plan for notifying the personnel who will monitor conservation easements in the future. The notification can take place through written policies.

## Forest Legacy tracts most likely to succeed to the year 3007 will:

- have project coordinators who ensure that the conservation easement terms can be monitored;



## Forest Legacy Projects Completed During FY 2007

In FY 2007, accomplishments occurred in 12 of the States served by the Northeastern Area, where a total of 68,884 acres was protected from conversion to nonforest uses. The Northeastern Area's cumulative FLP accomplishment is 1,060,319 acres on 251 tracts up through September 30, 2007. The total Federal investment of \$156,933,000 in the States served by the Northeastern Area has protected forests valued at \$315,663,000 through conservation easements and fee acquisitions, which makes the non-Federal cost-share 50 percent.

FY 2007 accomplishments of the Northeastern Area Forest Legacy Program, including projects in the States of Delaware, Indiana, Iowa, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, and Wisconsin, are highlighted on the following pages.

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### Green Horizons – Delaware

With the completion of the Green Horizons Phase 3 and 4 fee purchases, the Delaware Forest Service added 328 acres of loblolly pine forest to Redden State Forest in Sussex County. These new lands connect the Headquarters tract with the Chesapeake tract of the State forest and have significantly contributed to the State's efforts to protect working forest lands in an area that is highly sought after for residential development. The landowner, Glatfelter Pulp Wood Company, was paid \$5,200,000 by the State of Delaware for the two tracts on February 28, 2007. The FLP provided \$2,956,000, the State of Delaware provided \$744,000, and Sussex County provided \$1,500,000 towards the purchase.

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### Indian Creek 2 – Indiana

The current of FLP projects along Indian Creek in Greene County, IN, continued with the Indian Creek 2 tract. This tract is the third in a series of FLP projects totaling 2,300 acres that began with the Indian Creek 1 tract in 2002 and continued with the Indian Creek 3 tract in 2005. The enthusiasm spread by the Indian Creek 1 landowner was the catalyst for the other landowners to apply to the FLP. On September 17, 2007, the Indiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) met all FLP standards for reimbursement on the Indian Creek 2 tract easement, which the DNR had acquired in February 2007. The FLP contributed \$1,040,000 for the conservation easement on the 1,363-acre property owned by Danzer Forestland that was valued at \$1,205,000. A Nature Conservancy contribution of \$60,000 and a \$105,000 donation through a bargain sale completed the transaction.

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## Caves – Iowa

The Caves FLP tract, the second part of the Canyons Forest Legacy project, was protected from conversion to nonforest uses by the State of Iowa on January 30, 2007. The tract is adjacent to the 43-acre Searryl's Cave State Preserve, where the natural cave is home to a large wintering bat population. The central hardwood forests of the Caves tract will continue to provide natural cover along the North Fork of the Maquoketa River that crosses the property before entering the State Preserve. The 140-acre conservation easement was valued at \$115,800. The FLP contributed \$86,850; the Spaete family covered the remaining amount through a bargain sale. Situated in east Iowa, just outside of Dubuque, the limestone bluffs and canyons in the area are home to other cave formations, providing unique plant and wildlife habitats.

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
## Katahdin Ironworks – Maine

At the heart of the Appalachian Trail's notorious 100-Mile Wilderness lies the Katahdin Ironworks tract, 37,000 acres of productive forests and sweeping vistas. To avert the property's sale, the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC) acquired the property from International Paper in December 2003 through a transaction spearheaded by the Trust for Public Land (TPL). On March 21, 2007, the TPL facilitated the sale of a conservation easement from the AMC to the State of Maine. The Forest Legacy Program provided \$4,434,000 toward the purchase of the easement, valued at \$9,870,000. The Land for Maine's Future Program allocated \$1,250,000 and the Land and Water Conservation Fund State grant program provided \$231,621, with the balance coming from private donations.

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## Grafton – Maine

The 3,688-acre Grafton property lies at the heart of the Mahoosuc Mountains, which stretch from the White Mountains of New Hampshire into western Maine. This heavily wooded parcel encompasses the southern slope of Old Speck, Maine's highest mountain outside Baxter State Park, and runs adjacent to the most rugged mile of the Appalachian Trail—the famed Mahoosuc Notch. On May 25, 2007, the State of Maine purchased the parcel for \$2,850,000 with \$2,000,000 from the Forest Legacy Program, \$750,000 from the Land for Maine's Future Program, and \$100,000 in other private donations. Nestled within 30,000+ acres of Maine conservation lands, this tract will ensure public access to the Grafton Loop Trail and a popular snowmobile trail.

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## Prospect Hill – Massachusetts

For nearly 100 years, the Harvard Forest in Petersham, MA, has operated as a center of research and education for Harvard University. On December 29, 2006, the Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust sold a conservation restriction on the 100-acre Prospect Hill 1 parcel at a bargain price to the Massachusetts Department of Fish and Game and, at the same time, sold the land to Harvard University. The Forest Legacy Program contributed \$273,000 toward the acquisition of the conservation easement, valued at \$330,000. On February 3, 2007, landowner Richard Bryant sold a conservation restriction on the 68-acre Prospect Hill 2 tract, also adjacent to the Harvard Forest, to the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation Division of Water Supply Protection for \$55,000 and selling the underlying fee to Harvard University. The FLP contributed \$29,000 toward the acquisition of the conservation restriction. The Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust provided \$58,000 in cost share.

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## Ballard Hill – Massachusetts

The 33-acre Ballard Hill Forest Legacy project, located along the North Branch of the Nashua River in Lancaster, MA, adds protection to the Central Nashua River Valley Area of Critical Environmental Concern, a 20-mile riparian corridor of the North Nashua and Nashua Rivers. The property was acquired by the Lancaster Land Trust to prevent the sale of the property for residential development. Protected forests in the immediate vicinity include the adjacent Chapman-Goodale Conservation Area, the nearby Cook and Bartlett Pond Conservation Areas, and Lancaster State Forest. A conservation easement valued at \$265,000 was purchased by the State in a bargain sale from Lancaster Land Trust on September 27, 2006. The Forest Legacy Program contributed \$89,500 on December 30, 2006, after all FLP standards were met.

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## Bush Hill – Massachusetts

The Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) and the town of Ashburnham collaborated to acquire a conservation restriction on a 116-acre parcel owned by the George C. Beals Trust for \$113,000. The FLP cost share for the tract occurred on two abutting conservation restriction tracts totaling 98 acres and valued at \$177,000. The property also abuts 378 +/- acres of town of Ashburnham land acquired with other Federal funding, and a 128-acre completed FLP conservation restriction. The FLP funds were transferred to the DCR on January 10, 2007, when all FLP standards had been met.

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## Muschopauge Brook – Massachusetts

The Muschopauge Brook, which flows into the Quinapoxet Reservoir in central Massachusetts, is a major drinking water supply reservoir for the city of Worcester. The city was able to acquire the 106-acre Muschopauge Brook project, located in the town of Rutland, for its watershed, forest habitat, recreational, and scenic values. A partnership consisting of the city of Worcester, the Trust for Public Land, the White Oak Land Conservation Society, the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation, and the U.S. Forest Service helped with the acquisition. The FLP provided \$395,000 and the city of Worcester provided \$235,000 to acquire the parcel, owned by Blair Enterprises, Inc. The FLP funds were transferred to the city of Worcester on June 29, 2007, after all FLP standards had been met.

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## North Duluth – Minnesota

The protection of 768 acres on two tracts in Minnesota showcases the complementary nature of forestry, wildlife, and fish habitat. On December 29, 2006, the State of Minnesota purchased a conservation easement on the Moose Mountain tract valued at \$345,000 from landowners Mark Hagley and David Aspie using FLP funds. On January 30, 2007, the State purchased a conservation easement valued at \$375,000 on the Stanley Creek tract at a significant bargain sale from landowner Donald Mount using only \$20,000 in FLP funds. The easements will protect forested habitat for wide-ranging species, including the black bear and timber wolf. The forests will also continue to provide commercial forest products such as wood and maple syrup.

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## Sugar Hills – Minnesota

Sugar Hills was the first project completed by the Minnesota Forest Legacy Partnership, a public-private coalition formed to keep the State's Northwoods intact. The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, Division of Forestry purchased a conservation easement on the 1,659-acre Sugar Hills project in Itasca County, MN, on May 11, 2007. As part of the deal, the landowner, Liila Forest Products, will ensure public access for hunting, hiking, skiing, and other traditional forest uses while continuing to manage the tract's hardwood forests for sawtimber. The project, valued at \$1,800,000, was completed using \$825,000 from the Forest Legacy Program, \$250,000 from The Nature Conservancy, and \$653,000 from the State. The landowner donated \$72,000 in a bargain sale, which was facilitated by the Trust for Public Land.

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## Rossvie – New Hampshire

The 550-acre Rossvie tract, containing woodlands, ponds, and wetlands, is part of a working farm. Just a few miles from Concord, the State's capital city, the tract is nestled among several protected parcels that include 863 acres of city-owned forest land, 123 acres of State-owned forest land, and 289 acres of privately held conservation easement land. On February 9, 2007, the State of New Hampshire acquired the Rossvie conservation easement from landowners Wayne and Ruth Ross. The easement protects mountaintops from forest conversion. The easement, valued at \$2,470,000, was acquired with \$1,970,000 in FLP funds, \$200,000 from the city of Concord, and \$300,000 from the New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program. The Trust for Public Land helped with the project negotiations.

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## Bald Mountain – New Hampshire

The 376-acre Bald Mountain tract is one of two tracts in the New Hampshire Willard Pond Forest Legacy project. It is located in the rapidly developing Monadnock region of southern New Hampshire, where large blocks of forest land still remain. The State acquired a conservation easement on the property on March 21, 2007, from the current landowner, the New Hampshire Audubon Society, which had acquired the tract in fee until FLP funding was secure. The \$535,000 value of the easement was paid for entirely with FLP funds. Cost share is through the acquisition of a nearby conservation easement to be held by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. Located within the Contoocook River watershed, this tract is in the watershed of the pristine 108-acre Willard Pond.

## Gerard Woods – New Jersey

In December 2003, the State of New Jersey purchased the 1,200-acre Gerard Woods tract from the Lake Gerard Corporation with help from the Trust for Public Land (TPL). Acquisition of the tract enhances water quality within the New Jersey Highlands and preserves habitat for State threatened and endangered species. The appraised value of \$1,440,000 was funded fully through the FLP and was transferred to the State of New Jersey on March 7, 2007, after all FLP standards had been met. The 45-acre cost-share tract, known as Lake Lookover, was purchased by New Jersey for \$2,497,500—a significant cost share over match, which is a trend of the New Jersey FLP.

## History of Forestry – Pennsylvania

Land where the first American-trained foresters learned about silviculture will continue to be an educational resource for foresters. On December 20, 2006, Pennsylvania completed its first Forest Legacy conservation easement, in Milford, PA. This 1,191-acre project, called “History of Forestry,” now permanently protects forest land owned by the descendants of Gifford Pinchot, the first chief of the U.S. Forest Service and the “Father of American Forestry.” The property, also called the Milford Experimental Forest, will be used for research into current forestry issues. The \$4,015,833 conservation easement was funded with \$2,215,833 from the Forest Legacy Program and \$1,800,000 from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

## Weetamoo Woods – Rhode Island

Rhode Island’s Forest Legacy Program was able to celebrate the completion of its first acquisition of forest land in its East Bay Forest Legacy Area when, on December 21, 2006, the State of Rhode Island purchased a conservation easement from the Rhode Island Chapter of The Nature Conservancy (TNC). Diligent and persistent work finally paid off when TNC was able to reach agreement with National Grid (formerly Narragansett Electric Company) for the acquisition of three parcels, and with the Pereira family, for the acquisition of a fourth. TNC used the value of the Pereira parcel as cost share for the project. These acquisitions contributed an additional 101 acres to the 1,200 acres protected in the Weetamoo Woods Project area by the State, TNC, the Town of Tiverton, and the Tiverton Open Space Commission.

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## Adден Mountain – Vermont

Roy Amey's 1,358-acre property in Guildhall, VT, includes the summit of 2,400-foot Adден Mountain and the watershed basin for Catbow Swamp—a significant 400-acre wetland. With the assistance of the Conservation Fund, this land was protected with an FLP conservation easement purchased for \$644,500. The non-Federal cost share consisted of other forested parcels valued at \$220,000. The Adден Mountain tract is located in the midst of several conserved properties, including Cow Mountain Pond (the first-ever Forest Legacy project), Victory State Forest, and conserved former Champion lands totaling 155,000 acres. FLP funds were transferred to the State of Vermont on January 22, 2007, after all FLP standards were met

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## Chittenden County Uplands – Vermont

The Chittenden County Uplands Conservation multitract FLP project had a second tract added to the effort. On April 5, 2007, a conservation easement was purchased by the Vermont Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation on the 61-acre Yandow family tract. The Vermont Land Trust helped to acquire the conservation easement for \$127,000 paid by the Forest Legacy Program. The project's broad conservation goal is to conserve productive timber land and ecologically significant areas that link Mount Mansfield State Forest, in which the cost-share donation will occur, and Camel's Hump State Park, as a result protecting wildlife habitat in a rapidly developing region. FLP funds were transferred to Vermont on June 27, 2007, after all FLP standards had been met.

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## Wolf River – Wisconsin

An 18,513-acre area that connects with the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest became a completed FLP project on September 17, 2007, when the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) met all FLP standards for transfer of FLP funds to the State. The Wolf River FLP project, which consists of two conservation easements in Langlade County, WI, was acquired by the DNR from Plum Creek Timberlands in 2005 for \$9,180,000. Plum Creek manages the property for high-quality forest products, including veneer-quality timber. The DNR, through the two FLP conservation easements, ensures that the land continues to provide large forested blocks, which is habitat for gray wolves. The public can continue to enjoy hunting on the property, or hiking along portions of the National Scenic Ice Age Trail. The FLP contributed \$3,056,000 to the project; the Wisconsin DNR provided the cost share of \$6,124,000.




## Northeastern Area Forest Legacy Program Costs by Federal and Non-Federal Entities





This project involves the State's purchase of a conservation easement on a parcel of land in Shrewsbury and Mendon. Of the 951 acres, 901 acres are productive forest land and 50 acres are old fields reverting to woods.




