

Northeastern Area Forest Legacy Program Yearbook 2008



The Forest Legacy Program protects important forest lands by purchasing conservation easements or fee titles from willing landowners whose lands are threatened with conversion to nonforest uses. Forest Legacy properties offer recreational opportunities, watershed protection, timber resources, wildlife habitat, and protection from development.

Forest Legacy Program Synopsis

Program Purpose

The purpose of the Forest Legacy Program (FLP) is to protect environmentally important forest areas that are threatened by conversion to nonforest uses.

Program Description

The Forest Legacy Program is a partnership between participating States and the Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture. These two entities work together to identify important forest lands and protect them for future generations.

Conservation easements are the primary tool used to achieve this goal. Priority is given to lands that have important scenic or recreational values; riparian areas; fish and wildlife values, including threatened and endangered species; or other ecological values.

Program Characteristics

- The Forest Legacy Program is entirely voluntary. It operates only in States that have elected to join the program.
- The program helps States and regions identify important forest areas. Lands targeted for protection must fall within designated Forest Legacy Areas.
- State and local partners select priority tracts in cooperation with the Forest Service.
- The program is based on a “willing seller and willing buyer” concept.
- When conservation easements are used, the land remains privately owned.
- Other protection tools include full-fee purchase, voluntary deed restrictions, covenants, and agreements.
- The interests in land may be held by the Federal government or by the State or a unit of local government if the State chooses to select the State Grant Option as authorized by the 1996 Farm Bill.
- When the Federal government holds the easement, State or local units of government agree to administer the lands or interests in lands.
- The lands and interests are held in perpetuity. There is no loss of the Federal investment resulting from change of ownership.
- Forest Stewardship Plans that meet the landowner’s objectives for natural resource management are prepared on all privately owned tracts.
- The tracts acquired can remain “working forests” and can forever provide forest resources to meet the needs of the local community and the Nation.

Partner Roles

The Federal Role

The significance of the public benefits of a particular forest ranges from local to national in scope. Larger forests tend to be nationally significant because the values they provide are becoming rarer. Extensive forest areas are often subject to the additional challenge of multiple ownerships and numerous political jurisdictions. Through the Forest Legacy Program, the Federal government helps State and local governments look beyond their political boundaries to identify important forest areas. The Federal government provides oversight, and financial and technical assistance to help protect important forests.

The State Role

States integrate partner resources to cooperatively protect and maintain a forest land base. The lead agency, usually the State forestry agency, carries out the FLP in the State. Responsibilities include the following:

- Collecting information to identify and delineate important forest areas that may be selected as Forest Legacy Areas.
- Consulting with the State Forest Stewardship Coordinating Committee to achieve program purposes.
- Addressing land protection and forest management issues.
- Conducting land acquisition activities.
- Integrating policies and incentives to conserve a forest land base.
- Holding and administering the lands or interests in land that enter the FLP.
- Monitoring tracts for program compliance.

The State Forest Stewardship Coordinating Committee Role

The State Forest Stewardship Coordinating Committee's role is identified in the Cooperative Forestry Assistance Act. The committee acts as a consultant and makes recommendations. Its duties for the Forest Legacy Program, identified in the act and FLP guidelines, include:

- Establishing eligibility criteria and recommending Forest Legacy Areas in the Assessment of Need process.
- Prioritizing lands for inclusion in the FLP.

- Advising the State lead agency to achieve Forest Legacy Program objectives.

The Nongovernmental Organization (Land Trust) Role

Nongovernmental organizations, specifically land trusts or similar organizations, have a distinct relationship with the FLP. Because of their compatible interest in protecting land for conservation purposes, land trusts can be a primary contact with landowners to negotiate the purchase of conservation easements and to monitor the conservation easements once they are enrolled in the FLP. Lands acquired by or donated to land trusts may be counted toward the non-Federal cost-share amount of total program costs, provided the interests in lands contribute to the goals of the Forest Legacy Program and the lands are located within a Forest Legacy Area.

The Landowner Role

Landowner participation in the FLP is voluntary. A landowner joins the program either by conveying interests in lands to achieve the conservation objectives of the FLP or by purchasing or inheriting land that has already been committed to an FLP conservation easement. The landowner becomes a primary practitioner in maintaining the forest land base by implementing management activities guided by a Forest Stewardship Plan to conserve the values for which the land entered the program.



Federal, State, local, and nonprofit partners are all critical to ensuring the successful completion of Forest Legacy projects.

Notes:

- The scenario illustrates the importance of a records policy and monitoring policy. If a records policy existed, then the baseline document could likely be found.
- If there was a monitoring policy, the construction of a windmill and its accompanying impacts on conservation values and the costs to enforce this term after so many years could likely have been avoided.
- Remember, an easement document is only as good as the stewardship of the easement.

Answer #8:

False. If a right is severed or a license is granted for some use on the property before the conservation easement is in place, that right or license may not be subject to the conservation easement. Once a conservation easement is in place, new activities on the property are subject to the conservation easement.

Answer #9:

False. The exceptions are:

- Limited sand and gravel extraction for use on the property in support of traditional forest uses.
- Oil and gas extraction where there is limited localized impact as discussed in United States Code 26.

Answer #10:

True. Landowner participation in the FLP is voluntary and consists of two elements: 1) conveyance of lands or interests in lands to achieve FLP purposes, and 2) preparation of a Forest Stewardship Plan or multiresource management plan. The landowner and the State Forester or designee must approve the plan prior to the acquisition of the easement.

Answer #11:

False. The plan shall be kept current and updated as needed. Plan modifications must be agreed to by the State lead agency. If the landowner does not want to conduct an activity on his or her land, a plan is still required to show the effect of non-action on conservation values.

Answer #12:

False. The conservation easement can and should refer to a plan for any aspect of the conservation easement where predicting future conditions and knowledge would otherwise be required. Some management plans that may be referred to in conservation easements include those for recreation, water, oil and gas leasing, and agricultural activities.

Answer #13:

False. This is unlikely because conservation easements are generally seen as negative covenants on land. This means that they limit what can be done on the land but cannot force a landowner to take action on the land. Conservation easements can govern action if it is taken by the landowner. However, this has not yet been thoroughly tested by the courts.

Forest Legacy Projects Completed During FY 2008

In FY 2008, accomplishments occurred in 12 of the States served by Northeastern Area State and Private Forestry (NAS&PF), where a total of 104,543 acres was protected from conversion to nonforest uses. NAS&PF's cumulative FLP accomplishments since 1993 total 1,166,992 acres on 291 tracts through September 30, 2008. The total Federal investment of \$171,266,000 in the States served by NAS&PF has protected forests valued at \$357,290,000 through conservation easements and fee acquisitions.

FY 2008 accomplishments of the Northeastern Area State and Private Forestry Forest Legacy Program, including projects in the States of Delaware, Iowa, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Hampshire, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, and West Virginia, are highlighted on the following pages.

Green Horizons - Delaware

The fifth phase of the Delaware Green Horizons project consisted of three forested properties totaling 348 acres in Sussex County. Purchased from the Glatfelter Pulpwood Company for a fee simple sale price of \$3.98 million in December 2007, the FLP provided \$2 million, the State of Delaware \$761,500 and the Mt. Cuba Foundation \$1.2 million. Forest products produced from these working forest lands, which were added to the Redden State Forest's Townsend, Ellendale, and Jester Tracts, will help maintain a viable forest industry on the Delmarva Peninsula. FLP funds were transferred to Delaware on January 27, 2008, when all FLP standards had been met.

NE Upper Bluffs - Iowa

Two tracts in the Upper Iowa River bluff forest area are now protected from fragmentation and development by the FLP. The first tract was purchased by the State of Iowa from the Iowa Natural Heritage Trust on January 28, 2008. This 80-acre tract is an addition to the Yellow River State Forest in northeastern Iowa and fills a hole in public recreation, wildlife habitat, and forest management opportunities. The \$165,000 acquisition price paid by the State was composed of \$123,750 in FLP funds and \$41,250 provided by the Iowa Resource Enhancement and Protection Program. The second tract was protected with a conservation easement on 358 acres and was recorded March 7, 2008. The easement, valued at \$519,000, was acquired at a bargain sale for \$389,250 in FLP funds with landowners Pat and Karran Ryan donating the surplus value.

Monona - Iowa

Important woodland in the glaciated segment of Allamakee County, Iowa, which is also a prime housing development area, has been saved from conversion. The 209-acre Monona conservation easement was acquired with FLP funds from landowners Ronald and Rebecca Berns on May 29, 2008, at a bargain sale of \$187,650. The appraised value was \$250,600. The landowners, with the help of the Bureau of Forestry of the Iowa Department of Natural Resources and the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation, developed a Forest Stewardship Plan that will guide the management of the oak-hickory forests on the property.

Eagleville Pines - Massachusetts

This 100-year-old camp, situated on approximately 473 forest acres in the Eagleville Pines area of Athol and New Salem, MA, is host to hundreds of urban disadvantaged youth campers every summer. With funding from the FLP and facilitation by the Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust, the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation acquired a 283-acre conservation restriction on the forest surrounding the camp. Morgan Memorial Goodwill Industries sold the restriction, valued at \$955,000, to Massachusetts on October 30, 2007, for \$830,000 of FLP funds and donated the remaining value. The tract was one of the largest unprotected properties in the North Quabbin Region of north-central Massachusetts.

Quabbin Corridor Connection - Massachusetts

The Quabbin Corridor Connection project, which crosses four towns in central Massachusetts, is a multitract project comprised of 18 individual tracts of land that extends over a 9-mile expanse of rolling hills and intact forest lands. The project adds crucial links to an 80,000-acre tapestry of protected properties, including three Forest Legacy projects (Hutchinson-FY1996, 2-Mile Landbridge-FY2003, and Eagleville Pines-FY2008) and the Quabbin Reservoir—the water supply for Metropolitan Boston. Six tracts have been completed so far totaling 907 acres with a mix of conservation restrictions and fee purchases. The first tract, a 75-acre fee parcel, was purchased by the Massachusetts Department of Fish and Game in June 2006; the remaining five tracts were completed in December 2007, May 2008, and September 2008. The \$1,883,000 total cost of the first six tracts was paid for with \$499,000 in FLP funds and \$1,384,000 in cost-share funds that include landowner donations, funds from the State of Massachusetts, and the Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust, the project’s partnering land trust. Forest management, water supply protection for the greater Boston area, wildlife habitat, and public recreation opportunities are all benefits that will continue on these tracts.

Northern Great Lakes Forest - Michigan

The Two-Hearted River watershed in Michigan, made famous by Ernest Hemingway’s “Big Two-Hearted River” story, had 3,300 acres protected on April 28, 2008, when The Nature Conservancy transferred a 36,716-acre conservation easement to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. The conservation easement, purchased from Heartwood Forestland Fund IV, allows for public access in perpetuity for snowmobiling, hunting, fishing, hiking, and other recreational activities. Due to the size of the project, this working forest easement will also significantly contribute to the protection of forest industry jobs in the Upper Peninsula. The Forest Legacy Program contributed \$1.97 million, and the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund supplied \$3.54 million toward the total value of \$5,507,400 for Phase 3 of this multiphase project.

Robb Reservoir - New Hampshire

Conservation organizations have been seeking to protect the land surrounding Robb Reservoir for decades for the valuable waterfowl and warm-water fishery habitats provided by the reservoir. The 1,667-acre Robb Reservoir tract is located to the north of an Audubon property, and the previously completed Bald Mountain tract is to the south. New Hampshire acquired a conservation easement on the property on December 20, 2007, from the Trust for Public Land, which had acquired and held the tract until FLP funding was secure. The \$3,060,000 value of the easement was purchased for \$3,000,000 in FLP funds with the remaining value serving as a portion of the non-Federal cost share. The remainder of the cost share was through a donation of a 285-acre parcel of forest land to the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests.



The forests along the shore of Robb Reservoir will remain because of sustainable management and will continue to provide productive wildlife habitat and a natural view for canoeists and kayakers.

Tahawus - New York

With several peaks greater than 4,000 feet in elevation, and lakes, ponds, and streams that provide fishing habitat unsurpassed in the heart of the Adirondack Park, the previously inaccessible Tahawus property is now publicly owned. With help from the FLP, the State of New York purchased the 6,813-acre tract, which is located in the Town of Newcomb. The Department of Environmental Conservation will manage this mountainous property as a Forest Preserve. The acquisition by the State took place on January 31, 2008, for \$5,096,124 from the State's Environmental Protection Fund. After all FLP standards were met on July 11, 2008, the FLP reimbursed New York State \$1,676,000.

Muskingum North - Ohio

The State of Ohio acquired a conservation easement December 7, 2007, on a 436-acre property with 2,300 feet of frontage on the main stem of the Muskingum River, the largest watershed in Ohio. The property is adjacent to state-owned Tri-Valley Wildlife Area, a 16,200-acre public hunting area. This industrial forest property is owned by Superior Hardwoods of Ohio, Inc., which has historically managed and will continue to manage the forest for large-diameter, high-value wood products. The property includes river frontage, which has attracted second-home development. The conservation easement, valued at \$349,000, was acquired at a bargain sale from the landowner for \$261,750 with funds provided by the FLP.

Birdsboro Waters - Pennsylvania

The last remaining large, unfragmented forest in southeastern Pennsylvania could have been sold to a private water company with the intention of breaking up the forest that surrounds reservoirs and subsequently selling pieces to developers. However, Pennsylvania completed a conservation easement on the 1,727-acre Birdsboro Waters project on November 20, 2007. This area faces huge development pressure due primarily to its close proximity to the city of Philadelphia. The Birdsboro property houses several reservoirs and provides clean, abundant water and outdoor recreation opportunities to Birdsboro residents and surrounding municipalities. The \$2,200,000 value of the easement was acquired from the Birdsboro Water Authority using \$800,000 from the Forest Legacy Program, \$320,000 from the William Penn Foundation, and \$1,080,000 provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources via the State's Growing Greener II initiative.

Duval Trail West - Rhode Island

The 45-acre Duval Trail West forested property in South Kingstown, RI, was protected with a Forest Legacy conservation easement in December 2007. This tract is located along the western boundary of 220 acres protected by The Nature Conservancy and the South Kingstown Land Trust. The 166-acre Duval Trail Corridor, protected through the FLP in 2001, is the southern boundary of those tracts. The Forest Service transferred \$363,900 in Forest Legacy funds to the State of Rhode Island on June 11 after FLP standards were met. In addition, \$61,000 from the State of Rhode Island and landowner Larry Webster's donation of \$60,300 comprised the non-Federal cost share of the project.

Chittenden County Uplands - Vermont

The Chittenden County Uplands Project is a cooperative effort involving the Vermont Agency of Natural Resources, U.S. Forest Service, and the Vermont Land Trust to conserve the ecological integrity, rural character, and working landscape of the northeastern uplands of Chittenden County, Vermont. A combination of conservation easements and fee acquisitions by the State of Vermont on seven individual forested tracts added to the five previously completed tracts in prior years. The first six tracts, with a combined acreage of 2,736 acres, were entirely paid for with FLP funds of \$2,012,763. A seventh tract of 228 acres worth \$670,000 was donated by the landowner to the State of Vermont and was used as part of the non-Federal cost share all FLP projects must have. The project has protected portions of the Long Trail—the oldest long-distance hiking trail in the country—that is located along the spine of the Green Mountains of Vermont, connecting Massachusetts with Canada. The project has also added acreage to Mt. Mansfield State Forest and protected the scenic beauty of the hardwood forests for travelers on Interstate 89.

Trough - West Virginia

The State of West Virginia acquired its first FLP conservation easement along the South Branch of the Potomac River, which will help protect drinking water quality for much of Washington, DC, and help clean the Chesapeake Bay. On September 8, 2008, a conservation easement was purchased by the State of West Virginia from landowner Timothy Stewart. The 764-acre forested Trough tract conservation easement was valued at \$458,124 and was acquired at a bargain sale from the landowner with \$343,593 in FLP funds. West Virginia is working on additional tracts in the South Branch project for further conservation opportunities through the FLP.




Forest Legacy Program Costs by Federal and Non-Federal Entities**




